The church of St. Andrew is a fine edifice of stone in the Decorated and Perpendicular styles, consisting of chancel, nave, aisles, south porch with parvise and a lofty western tower with pinnacles, containing a clock with two dials and chimes, the gift of Sir R. Harvey kt. placed in 1898, and bells, all cast by Thomas Bilbie in 1762, and re-hung, 1896, by Mr. Harry Stokes, of Woodbury, the 4th bell being at the same time re-cast by Messrs. Mears and Stainbank, London: the chancel retains three canopied stone stalls and a piscina, and there are two mural brasses on black marble, erected by the late Major Trist, of Tristford, in memory of his two sons, who died in India and the West Indies: the stone pulpit is octagonal, richly carved with foliage, and has figures of apostles in niches: the fine wood screen, 41 feet in length, and containing eleven bays exclusive of doors, was thoroughly restored at the cost of the late Mrs. Pendarves, of Tristford, about 1870, and there are two light responses in 1870, from windows were erected on the light parcloses: in 1896 new windows were erected on the south side to the memory of Major Trist; and a mural tablet erected to the Rev. R. Bartholomew, late vicar, who died April 18, 1896, after a residence of 37 years: the font is Anglo-Norman. In the churchyard is a large marble mausoleum belonging to the Harvey family, and surmounted by a tall cross; within are three marble sarcophagi, one of which contains the remains of Lady Harvey (wife); another that of Robert Godefroy (Tito), son and heir of Sir Robert Harvey kt. who died at school in 1895, and also bears a life-size recumbent effigy, executed by Hems, of Exeter; another contains the remains of Alfred Northey, third son of Sir Robert Harvey, and to each of these memorial windows have been placed in the church: in the churchyard also stands a cross, restored by Hems, at the cost of Sir R. Harvey: in 1898 a reredos, of alabaster and mosiac, was presented by the Hon. Mrs. and Miss Dorothy Jervoise Smith, who were responsible for the provision in 1904 of a new lectern and of new choir stalls in 1907: in 1911 the organ was rebuilt and re-erected in the Englebourne chapel, the western archway opened out, a new screen eracted and the gallery taken down. The register of baptisms dates from the year 1623; marriages, 1625; burials, 1621. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £315, including 14 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Exeter, and held since 1896 by the Rev. Harberton gives the title of Viscount (1791) in the Irish peerage to the family of Pomeroy. Tristford is the property of Francis Warren Trist esq. The manor was anciently held by the Valletorts, but the land is now all freehold. The principal landowners are F. W. Trist esq. Miss Laura Paige, Sir Robert Harvey, of Dundridge, and the trustees of the late Charles William Tayleur esq. of St. Mary Church. The soil is generally Tayleur esq. of St. Mary Church. The soil is generally light and fertile; subsoil, dunstone and slate. The crops are oats, wheat, barley and roots, but the land is crops are cats, wheat, barley and roots, but the land is chiefly in pasture. The parish includes the following hamlets, viz.:—Belsford, I mile north-west; East Leigh, I south-west; West Leigh, I south-west, and Englebourne or Inglebourne, I south. The acreage is 5,606; rateable value, £11,816; the population in 1911 was 1,139 in the civil parish, which includes Harbertonford, and 591 in the ecclesiastical parish.

HARFORD is a parish and village, on the river Erme and on the edge of Dartmoor, 2½ miles north from Ivy-bridge station on the South Devon section of the Great Western railway, 13 north-east from Plymouth and 14 south-east from Tavistock, in the Southern division of the county, Ermington hundred, Ermington and Plympton petty sessional division, Plympton St. Mary union, county court district of Plymouth and in the Plympton rural deanery, archdeaconry of Totnes and diocese of Exeter. The church of St. Petrock is a small but ancient building of granite in the Early English style, consisting of chancel, nave, south aisle, separated from the nave by an arcade of four arches, north transept, south nave by an arcade of four arches, north transept, south porch, and a low embattled western tower containing 3 bells: the chancel retains a fine trefoil-headed piscina, and at the end of the aisle is a hagioscopa; the mediæval font is a plain work of granite, with an octagonal basin, and there is a Saxon font, now placed in the tower: in the church is a brass, with effigy in plate armour, inscriptions and shield of arms, to Thomas Williams esq. Speaker of the House of Commons, ob. 1 July, 1566; also a monument, with effigies in brass, to John Prideaux, of Stowford in this parish, and his wife Agnes, with seven sons and three daughters, erected in 1639 by their 4th son, John Prideaux D.D. a native of Stowford, Regius Professor of Divinity at Oxford, rector Stowford, Regius Professor of Divinity at Oxford, rector of Exeter College, and bishop of Worcester, 1641-50: the nave has a ribbed waggon roof, resting on carved and decorated wall plates; that on the north side bears the legend, "I.H.S. helpe us. Amen. Walter Hele, p'son, 1539. I.H.S. salus;" from the wall plates spring pson, 1539. I.H.S. sains; From the wan places spring carved branches continued in twining stems along the ribs and expanding on either side into gracefully designed leafage: the church has been restored since 1877 at a cost of £365, and affords 200 sittings. The register dates from the year 1724; there are church-wardens' books dating from 1695, and in the church is

a complete list of rectors from 1262. The living is a rectory, net yearly value £166, including 50 acres of glebe, with residence, built by the Rev. W. Sanders, rector in 1843, in the gift of J. J. MacAndrew esq. and held since 1896 by the Rev. John Arthur Uran M.A. of Oxford University. The rectory house retains a fine old carved university and the rectory house retains a fine old carved porch dating from the reign of Charles I. and once carved porch dating from the reign of Charles I. and once forming the entrance to the ancient residence. The romantic scenery at Tor Rocks, in the valley of the Erme and Harford Bridge, attracts numerous pleasure parties during the season. Here was born 17 Sept. 1578, John Prideaux, bishop of Worcester, who died at Bredon, Wores. 20 July, 1650. Harford Hall, now a farmbouse, was once the residence of Elizabeth (Chudleigh), wife of Evelyn (Pierrepont), and Duke of Kingston, who became Evelyn (Pierrepont), 2nd Duke of Kingston, who became notorious through her trial before the peers in 1776 for bigamy. Lukesland, about a mile south of the village. standing in a park of about 100 acres, is the seat of James Johnston MacAndrew esq. J.P. who is lord of the manor and chief landowner. The soil is light; the chief crops are corn and roots. The parish contains 2,108 acres of inclosed land and 1,300 acres moorland, and 12 of water; rateable value, £2,260; the population in 1911 was 127 in the civil and 228 in the ecclesiastical parish.
